Moore further explained she would like to see more religious services, competitive athletics and clear communication with scheduling at Girls State.

Arzabala agreed, despite being a Federalist, yet still expanded on her own platform. She discussed better mental health services and took an ecological standpoint on produced from the cafeteria.

Some recent discussions have pointed out differences between the Highway Patrol of Missouri Boys State and ALA Missouri Girls State, most notably laws regarding ALA MGS citizens walking on

Upon interview, MBS Troopers Shea Perkins of Blair City, Grayson Thompson of Whitfield City and Ethan Thompson of Lewis City all provided their insight and thoughts.

On the MBS side, the troopers regarded their roles as promoters of the law throughout not only the streets, but also individual counties and cities if necessary. However, they were unaware of certain restrictions upon ALA MGS citizens. only allowed to walk alone within their city hall. Otherwise, they would have to at least be accompanied by a buddy. Trooper

Perkins agreed it was a "safe measure," but agreed there were potential solutions that enforced less restrictions upon citizens.

For one ALA MGS trooper, similar sentiments were found.

#### Flag-stealing scandal at Rauch Memorial Hall

Carver City's spirit flag was taken in the middle of the night, then later returned

Who would have thought citizens at ALA Missouri Girls State would be spending more time plotting to steal rather than studying or focusing on candidate debates?

Late Tuesday night, Rauch Memorial Hall was devastated when someone from one of the cities in the building — either Cronin City or Clark City — stole the spirit flag from Carver City not long after they had just won it. The spirit flag was returned early this morning, although no one has any idea on who returned it or why.

Accusations have been made on which girl stole the flag but no one has come forward with any additional information.

When speaking with Carver City, multiple girls said they feel betrayed by their county and feel as if they can't trust anyone in their dorms anymore. Rebekah Douglas of Carver City said she can't believe "they would do something so childish." When asked how she feels over the loss of their flag Rebekah replied with, "I'm sad, I trusted you, I voted for you and you betrayed

Everyone in Carver City just wants to know why? Why did someone do something so radical in front of eyewitnesses? Two Carver City counselors, Vivian McFadden and Miss Eva, were lucky enough to notice a girl stealing their newly won flag. The two counselors were holding a city meeting on the second floor of Rauch Memorial Hall when they noticed someone sneaking up the stairs and reaching for the

When asked about the traumatic experience, Miss Eva said, "My immediate reaction was to jump out of my seat and see where they were going. While Miss Eva chased after the thief, Vivian yelled 'Hey!' very loudly and then I ran to my troopers and told them the information."

The smuggler was too quick for even the ALA MGS Highway Patrol. All citizens of Carver City were kept up all night worrying they would never get the beloved spirit flag

Emaline Little, an attorney at Carver City, said she had no idea what was going on when the flag was stolen. She said she has now been informed of what happened

and said, "Carver is considering all of their options." She also said she wants to make it known that if they do decide to take action, "they will be completely ready."

Even though Carver City's attorney wouldn't share who she believes stole the flag, Mya White and Danielle Cortez have already made accusations as to who did this.



# Holt gets pushback in State of the State

Missouri Boys State Gov. John Holt delivered the State of the State address to the General Assembly late Tuesday night in Harmon Hall.

In the address, Holt discussed several MBS policy changes. Casinos are to be limited to one per county and there is be a 25 percent state tax on all gambling earnings and profits. Business licensing

costs will decrease from \$10 BSB to \$25 BSB, promoting local business.

Funds have been allocated for beautification grants, in an attempt to increase city spirit. Water access has been address with a mandate for reusable water bottles

Holt's mandates related to casinos have received pushback by the General Assembly. With many MBS citizens adoring gambling, previous proposals have been made for gambling tax breaks.

Nationalist Party candidate Hayden Hradek and Federalist Party candidate Brookson Ware were firing back and forth in Wednesday afternoon's Missouri Boys State gubernatorial debate at Hyland Arena. Ware promised funding for veterans,

Johnson played his saxophone, filling the room with sonorous smooth jazz. He asked if the audience would prefer to hear more of his speech or more of his tunes, ultimately delivering what the people wanted — more sweet music.

The secretary of state candidates were Nationalist Philip Shimon of Kohn City and Federalist Solomon Narraine of Lewis City. Phillip claimed he was not spoiled by the pride of politics, promising transparency in how tax dollars are spent. Narraine shook the room by detailing a bribe he had received to keep quiet about how much members of the news outlet KMBS were being paid \$1000 BSB. This claim has yet to be confirmed or denied.

The lieutenant governor candidates were Nationalist Garrett Flack and Federalist Ridwan Osman. Flack appealed to the patriotism of Boys State, yelling that citizens "Bleed red, white and blue!" Osman talked about his relationships as a brother and son. He then described a sacrifice he had made, choosing Boys State over another prestigious opportunity. Ridwan ended by taking a bold step, blaming the staff for dividing us into red and blue — claiming all citizens should be united.

Federalist Party Chairman John Honnold fired shots at the nationalist party throughout the rally, mostly concerning their attempted lawsuit against the news


outlet KMBS.
